Year 5 Tokyo 2020 Olympics- Travels to Tokyo Knowledge Content

Core Subjects:

Links to theme

English

- Write instructions in the form of recipes for the international food festival.
- Use persuasive devices to create fact files and brochures encouraging tourists to visit some of the different landmarks in Tokyo.
- Create a presentation/information text about the different venues that make up the Tokyo Olympic park.
- Plan a whole class debate about the environmental impact of the Olympic games.

Mathematics

- To use mathematics to evaluate the cost of hosting the Olympic games
- Use and compare statistics of some of the Olympic record holders of the past

Children will work collaboratively as part of groups and teams throughout this topic.

Understand the culture of Japan and how Japanese culture has influenced life today.

Foundation Subjects

History, Geography and Citizenship

History:

• A study of the history of the Olympic games, locating where they have been held in the past and the sporting events that they consisted of.

Geography:

- A study of the locality of Tokyo and its geographical features including key landmarks.
- A study of the impact of the Olympic and Paralympic games on the environment of Tokyo and Japan.

Citizenship:

- Evaluate the legacy of the Olympic Games
- A study of society in Tokyo finding out about the daily life of Japanese children.

Art and Design and Design Technology

Art:

 Children look at some of the posters/artwork that have been created to mark the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo. Discuss the use of images, colours etc. Re-create images/colours and styles from the posters.

Music:

- Sing Olympic themed songs and compose Olympic-themed musical pieces combining musical elements within a structure.
- Compose theme music for part of the whole school mini Olympics e.g. opening or medal ceremony – discuss and research the idea of ceremonial music – rousing tunes. Listen to previous anthems etc.

Music, Languages and Physical Education

P.E.

- Organise a whole school Mini-Olympics. Assign different jobs to different year groups and make decisions about the sporting events that will be included. What coaching/teaching requirements will there need to be?
- Research importance of a healthy lifestyle.

Year 5 Tokyo 2020 Olympics- Travels to Tokyo: Links to National Curriculum Framework Skills

Core Subjects:

English

- To read a variety of texts and extrapolate information.
- To write summaries of research.
- To ask questions to improve understanding.

- Name and locate the countries in Asia and identify their main physical and human characteristics.
- Collect and analyse statistics and other information in order to draw clear conclusions about locations.
- Use a range of geographical resources to give detailed descriptions and opinions of the characteristic features of a location.
- Identify and describe geographical significance of latitude, longitude and Equator.
- Use four-figure grid reference.

Art and Design and Design Technology

Art:

- Use a variety of techniques to add interesting details like shading.
- Create an original piece showing a range of influences and styles.

Core Subjects

English

- Children demonstrate that they can participate in a debate, listening carefully and responding appropriately

- Children can use the structural and language features of information texts when writing about the different venues that make up the Tokyo Olympic park.

Mathematics

- Children demonstrate that they can use all four mathematical operations to evaluate the cost of hosting the Olympic games. (Including formal written methods)
- Children are able to use averages, graphs, tables and charts to compare statistics of some of the Olympic record holders of the past.

 Children are able to demonstrate through maps, charts and writing, where the Olympic Games have been held in the past and the sporting events that they consisted of.

Geography:

- Children can use maps to explain the locality of Tokyo and its geographical features including key landmarks
- Children are able to identify the environmental impact of the Olympic and Paralympic games on the environment of Tokyo and Japan.

Citizenship:

 Through a study of society in Tokyo, children are able to identify key differences between the lives of the rich and poor in the society of Tokyo. They can offer suggestions about why the equality exists and suggest some possible actions or solutions.

Art and Design and Design Technology

 Children are able to use a range of drawing, painting and shading techniques to re-create images/colours and styles from the Olympic posters.
