Weekly Gospel – John 1: 35-42 The next day John was standing there again with two of his disciples, when he saw Jesus walking by. "There is the Lamb of God!" he said. The two disciples heard him say this and went with Jesus. Jesus turned, saw them following him, and asked, "What are you looking for?" They answered, "Where do you live, Rabbi?" (This word means "Teacher.") "Come and see," he answered. (It was then about four o'clock in the afternoon.) So they went with him and saw where he lived, and spent the rest of that day with him. One of them was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. At once he found his brother Simon and told him, "We have found the Messiah." (This word means "Christ.") Then he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked at him and said, "Your name is Simon son of John, but you will be called Cephas." (This is the same as Peter and means "a rock.")

The gospel today tells us about how some of the disciples first became followers of Jesus.

Jesus looked at Simon and decided he should be called Peter, which means "rock". Why do you think Jesus chose this name for Simon Peter?





This week in Little Gems...


Three Wise Men came to see the new King. !!!!!!!

WINSTON CHURCHILL

Winston Churchill was born on 30 November 1874 and died on 24 January 1965. He was born in a noble family. The name of the family of Churchill is Dukes of Marlborough. His father was Lord Randolph Churchill. He too was a politician.





Winston Churchill became twice the Prime Minister of the UK. He was a politician as well as an author. His first term of office began on May 10^{th} ,1940 and ended on July 26, 1945. His second term of office began on October 26,1951 and ended on April 6^{th} ,1955. He was one of the finest leaders of the 21^{st} century during times of war.

KEY EVENTS

World War II

At the start of World War II, Churchill was again put in charge of the Navy. In 1940 the war was going badly for Britain. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain resigned on May 10 and Churchill was given the job. Some people thought that Britain could not win the war, and that the British government should make peace with Hitler. Churchill was sure that Britain could win, and promised to continue the fight. He made famous speeches that are still remembered today.
